Approved Pony Party Criteria Introduction

Our new BHS Approved Centre Scheme for Pony Party providers is an exciting new initiative designed to engage and support those who are not a riding school, but who provide that all important, first contact with ponies through various occasions, celebrations, and activities.

The scheme is designed to support businesses to provide this much needed service and help to promote safe and encouraging environments for people to experience the benefits of horses, with education and welfare at the heart of it all

Whilst many ponies have lovely natures and may well enjoy the attention they receive when being used for Pony Party activities, the following guidance hopes to outline the essential care needs for ponies to meet the needs of their five welfare domains whilst also explaining some key considerations when deciding if a pony is well suited to this role. The welfare domains relate to the suitability of their physical environment, nutrition, health, behavioural interactions and their mental state.

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It is a legal requirement for ponies used in pony party activities to be licensed by the local authority. The type of license will depend on the provision offered by the pony party provider. Anytime a child is placed upon a pony, no matter how briefly, then a riding school licence known as the 'hiring out of horses' licence is required which involves an independent veterinary inspection of the ponies suitability for use. For all other pony party activities, a license is required for the 'keeping or training of animals', sometimes referred to as an 'Animal Activities' license.

This scheme is only accessible for businesses operating out of their own premises. Applications cannot be accepted from businesses based at or operating from either livery yards or riding schools that are not already on the BHS Approved Centre scheme. Any unapproved but licensed riding school wishing to access this scheme would need to initially join us as a BHS Approved Riding school. 1	To ensure ponies are kept and cared for in a suitable and safe environment, the management, responsibility and supervision of ponies must be overseen by person(s) with suitable equestrian experience				This can be evidenced either through a combination of CV, equestrian qualifications and professional discussion
2	Companionship of other equines must be available to the ponies with positioning of their accommodation or turnout areas allowing them to be as a minimum, in sight and sound of others				
3	Accommodation, whether field shelter, stable or stall arrangement must be large enough to allow freedom to move around and have deep bedding to encourage a pony to safely lie down or even have a roll. It should be well ventilated, and the construction should be safe with no protrusions, gaps or other hazards that could risk injury to the pony.				Where rubber matting might be used a sufficient layer of bedding is still advised. It's important that the pony has view of others so it's worth lowering the height of the stable door if necessary to avoid risk of them straining their necks trying to peep over the top!
4	A4 Each horse in use must have an Annual Horse Health check, completed by an RCVS Equine vet to declare their suitability for use in declared activities.				A4 This form is available as an appendix at the rear of this document. It can be completed by the Centres' regular RCVS qualified equine veterinarian and must be submitted on an annual basis to approvedcentres@bhs.org.uk. It is the Centres responsibility to ensure this is completed prior to a horse being used for sessions.

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5	Grazing and turnout must be available, ideally in a small herd situation, with a grassland management plan in place to ensure there is minimal risk to health or behaviour problems associated with too much grass in their diet. 6	 Routine health care checks and preventative care plans are in place to include the following Daily observational (visual) health checks that include behaviour, appetite etc Hoof and Tooth care Dietary needs Body Condition 				All ponies need a balanced diet that enhances keeping them healthy. However, it's important to remember they're all individual and their breed, type or age are just a few of the factors to consider. Whilst they should have continual access to clean drinking water, they often need a controlled approach rather than continual access to food! Regular monitoring of their weight through body condition scoring will be important and help you in adjusting their diet through the differing seasons. <u>bhs.org.uk/horse-care-and-welfare/health- care-management/</u> Visits from a qualified and registered farrier for hoof trimming or shoeing and veterinary visits for scheduled vaccination alongside checks upon teeth from either the veterinarian or a qualified equine dental technician should all be part of ensuring your pony's health needs are being met.

2	At all times a kind and considerate approach should be taken when planning activities with provision for adaptations within a session				Educating participants into the correct and kind way to handle and treat all animals should feature highly in any sessions being held
3	Duration and frequency of sessions should be relatively short to ensure ponies have regular breaks, with access to water and shelter between sessions and quiet periods for them to be left in peace throughout the day. 2	Ponies should be used that are trained to be well behaved on the lead rein and those leading the ponies should be confident in pony handling techniques.				Ponies should be used that are trained to be well behaved on the lead rein, not simply used as they are unsuitable when off the lead rein! Those leading the ponies should be confident in pony handling techniques and have had an induction in how to safely lead before they lead with a rider. It is recommended than lead rope/lines should be used by the leaders and securely attached to either the bit or the headcollar.
3	Ponies should only be handled and ridden under supervision and never be left unsupervised during the activity. There should be a clear activity plan in place				For example, leading round 'the fairy trail' or embarking on an activity route, such as weaving through cones or other equipment.

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4	All tack and equipment should fit and be suitable for purpose. Any additional equipment or participant apparel, such as clothing, should not pose risk of fright or concern to the pony.				Safe equipment such as reins being the correct length to minimise risk of a riders' feet catching, include use of safe stirrups or toes toppers etc when children do not have suitable footwear

2	Ponies must be fit to travel with consideration being given n in the planning stages to the duration of the journey				To be considered as fit to travel to an event/party, a pony would be showing its normal healthy state, for example, it would not be showing signs of ill health such as excessive nasal discharge, raise in respiratory rate or should not be fatigued or infirm or unable to move without pain or resistance Journey duration needs consideration when planning any off site activities. Ponies will still require access to water, shelter and forage, such as hay throughout their day. Being observant for signs of dehydration in hot weather is just as important as encouraging the ponies to stale, as many won't do so when travelling.

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3	Protection from risk of injury should be maintained during travel				Well-fitting, correctly applied protective travelling equipment may be useful to offer protection during transport provided it is securely fastened to prevent slipping or risk of injury.
